Greeley Redeye Rotary has sponsored a Food Pantry at Winograd K-8 School in Greeley-Evans School District 6. The Success Foundation serving Greeley-Evans Schools and District 6 have teamed up to ensure that every school has a food pantry that students and families can access to supplement food supplies in their homes. The pantries are now in 33 schools, and include dry, canned, fresh and frozen foods.

Greeley-Evans School District 6 serves nearly 23,000 students. Of those, 70 percent of students qualify for free and reduced lunch, a marker for living in poverty. While students do get fed breakfast and lunch at school, there is often the need for supplemental food to help students and family eat at times where kids are not in school.

The Redeye Rotary grant and matching dollars will help buy food for the pantry for two years. Members visited the food pantry in September 2024, and got to see and hear first-hand how important this supplemental food source is to students and families at the site.

Then in early January, members met at the Warehouse for District 6 to help the Food Pantry Specialist Liz Stockham pack crates of food that would be distributed to all the schools to replenish their food pantries. Liz has since joined our Greeley Redeye Rotary club as a new member! That day, members packed dozens of crates of non-perishable foods for the pantries.

Last year, several members also volunteered at the District 6 Central Kitchen to cut and package donated cheese for the food pantries.

Here is what Liz said about how important these food pantries are to District 6 students and families:

"I have had students who stop by their school pantry to pick up dinner for younger siblings they need to feed while their parents are at work. We are filling a need to help families stay nourished, and helping to keep students on track with their education."
