Listeners now are able to select a song and if we don't have it in our library we download right away and play it instantly," said Programmes Director for the institution Paul Kamlongera.

Kamlongera said the donation had helped the radio station to enrich its music library because now it was possible to access free gospel music from different sites which is giving listeners a wide variety of choice.

Past president for Lilongwe Rotary Club Stallard Mpata said the club was proud to be part of ABC's technological development because it appreciates the services that the institution renders to Malawians.
